Seven Bible Stories to Use With Muslims



There is no substitute for the Gospel (I Corinthians 15:1-8), and these stories are vital to a Muslim's understanding of the Gospel. There is power in the Scriptures and this is where we must begin. As believers, we should know these stories so well that we can share them as naturally as talking about sports, the weather, or any other matter of life. We are reminded in Acts 10:43, "To him give all the prophets witness, that through his name whosoever believeth in him shall receive remission of sins." The goal of telling these stories is to help the listener find the Lamb of God!

THE STORY OF **ADAM & EVE**



THE KEY: God promises a great sacrifice; God provides a garment of righteousness; our shame can only be covered by God's garment. (Genesis 3, note v.15 & 21)

THE STORY OF **ABEL & CAIN**



THE KEY: The sacrifice must be offered God's prescribed way—only a

lamb is accepted. (Genesis 4:1-17)

THE STORY OF NOAH



THE KEY: The Sacrifice must be **acted upon**—we must get in the ark.

(Genesis 6:6-8:20; Genesis 9:12-17)

THE STORY OF **ABRAHAM**



THE KEY: Abraham believed God would provide; a **lamb** is the substitute; Only God provides a fit lamb for sacrifice. (Genesis 12:1-4; Genesis 15:1-6; Genesis 17; Genesis 22, note v. 8-14; Romans 4:1-22; Galatians 3:8-9)

THE STORY OF **MOSES**



THE KEY: The blood of the Lamb must be directly applied. (Exodus 11:4-5; Exodus 12:23-24; Exodus 12:29-32)

THE STORY OF **JOHN THE BAPTIST**



THE KEY: Make a straight path in the desert; **Behold** the Lamb of God! (John

1:29; Luke 3:4-6)

THE STORY OF JESUS, THE **MESSIAH**



THE KEY: The sinless Lamb of God, Messiah, the Anointed King. (Matthew

24:14, John 18:36-37, John 4:41-42, John 12:32; John 14:6, I Corinthians 5:18-21, II Peter 1:19-21)



The purpose of knowing and sharing these stories is to help

the listener find the Lamb!

JESUS IS THE GOAL! When dealing with Muslims, much emphasis is placed on debating the religion of Islam. Certainly, there are times when the difficult questions of our sincere Muslim friends should be thoroughly answered, but we should never be given to arguing theology. We must give ourselves to the single task of making Jesus known. Jesus is beautiful. He is beyond compare. He still has power. We have one responsibility—to lift up Jesus. It is in the light of His beauty that He will dispel the darkness. Muslims need to see Jesus for Who He is and the change that He has made in you, His messenger. And therein lies the power of these stories.
