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INTRODUCTION

“Call unto me, and I will answer thee, and shew thee great and mighty things, which thou knowest not.” –Jeremiah 33:3

The secret to revival is not found in better revival preaching—it is found in more fervent revival praying! Would you join us for five weeks of revival praying?

- **Revival praying is for all of God’s people.** Perhaps you are wondering what you can do to make a difference in this world. You can pray!
- **Revival praying is guided by God’s Word.** In his book, *Sense and Nonsense About Prayer*, Lehman Strauss wrote, “We can pray in the will of God only as we pray by the Word of God. What the Holy Spirit teaches us through our Bible study is inseparably tied to successful praying. The Holy Spirit will never lead us to pray for anything that is contrary to the written Word of God.” As we study God’s Word, we learn how to pray effectively.
- **Revival praying is connecting our prayers to God’s purpose.** It has been said that revival is not getting our will done in heaven but getting God’s will done on earth! Instead of asking the Lord to bless our ideas,

efforts, and goals, we must join our prayers to His eternal purpose.

We are concentrating our study in the book of Ezra. The student guide is meant to be used alongside the full-length book, *Revival Praying*. More importantly, each lesson is designed to help you dig more deeply into God's Word. Open your Bible and keep an open heart. The Lord has so much to teach us!

As we begin our study of *Revival Praying*, join me in praying the prayer of the first disciples, "Lord, teach us to pray" (Luke 11:1).

BUILD THE ALTAR

SCRIPTURE: EZRA 3:1-3; 7:10

The material in this Bible study is taken from *Revival Praying*, pages 1- 15, 65-67.



FOUNDATIONAL TRUTHS

- Revival is possible (Psalm 138:7; Isaiah 59:1; Matthew 19:26; Romans 5:20).
- The one thing that limits God's power in us is our unbelief (Matthew 13:58).
- Spiritual awakenings come when people begin to pray (Hosea 10:12; Acts 1:13-14, 2:1).



THE BIG IDEA

Throughout Scripture, an altar symbolizes access to God and is always the beginning of divine blessings. This does not mean that we must construct a

physical structure; it means that we must build the priority of prayer into our schedules and routines. The first step to revival is a return to prayer.



THE STORY

Read Ezra 3:1-3. The Old Testament historical book of Ezra is a book of return and revival. Ezra was dealing with a small group of God's people whose nation had been in bondage. They were in danger of losing another generation and longed to see the Lord work again. What was their first order of business? They built an altar.

Zerubbabel and Ezra led two returns that preceded the return led by Nehemiah. This reveals a divine order. Nehemiah would do the vital work of rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem, but the altar had to be rebuilt and the Temple worship renewed before the walls could be reconstructed. People are not safe

FOUNDATIONAL TRUTHS

- In our wicked world, we are sure to hear *bad news* (2 Timothy 3:13; Ezra 9:1-2).
- Spiritual people do not simply *talk about the darkness* around them, they *talk to God* in prayer (Ezra 9:3).
- True revival praying must always begin with *brokenness* (Ezra 9:3-5).



THE BIG IDEA

There is a difference between praying for revival and revival praying. Did you know that you can

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pray for revival and never experience it? You do not experience revival simply because you ask for it. Revival comes when our prayers become aligned with God's Word.



THE STORY

Read Ezra 9:1-6. Ezra demonstrated a humility and brokenness that is essential if God's people are to return to the Lord. This is a man desperate after God—someone who understands that he does not have what he needs and realizes no one else can supply it. Ezra knew that God alone could bring the revival that was needed in his land.

The starting point of Ezra's prayer reveals a heart that is in agreement with God. Ezra did not have to beg God to send revival. He simply began to acknowledge God and agree with what God had already said. He got in step with God's truth. If we

REVIVAL PRAYING: INTERCESSION

SCRIPTURE: EZRA 9:1-7

FOUNDATIONAL TRUTHS

- Nothing reveals the heart like our prayers, and often when we think we are most spiritual, we actually reveal how truly self-centered we have become. Even prayers can be offered selfishly (James 4:3).
- Intercession is the highest form of prayer because it is the kind of praying our Savior does! The Lord Jesus Christ is praying for each of us, and He desires us to join Him in the work of intercession (John 17).

BIBLE STUDY WEEK THREE

- Prayer is the _____ *greatest work* _____ because, as we pray, God works, both in us and in others (Galatians 6:2).



THE BIG IDEA

There is a prayer meeting already in progress at the throne of God, and we have the privilege of participating with Him in the work of intercession. You cannot do everything, but you can do something. You can pray.

Our prayers will accomplish more than all of our lecturing, debating, and pleading with others. If we want to see a great spiritual awakening, we need to stop fussing about everything that is bad and go to the God who is always good, saying, “We trust You to do what You alone can do.”



KEY VERSE

“Since the days of our fathers have we been in a great trespass unto this day; and for our iniquities have we, our kings, and our priests, been delivered into the hand of the kings of the lands, to the sword, to captivity, and to a spoil, and to confusion of face, as it is this day.” —Ezra 9:7

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THE STORY

Read Ezra 9:1-7. Ezra was more than a worker, a teacher, and a leader. He was a man of prayer, a man who understood that both he and those around him needed the Lord. As soon as Ezra had made a thorough confession to God above, he began praying for those around him. Confession of sin should naturally lead to intercession for others. As we bear the needs of others God continues to work in our own lives. Remember that “*the LORD turned the captivity of Job, when he prayed for his friends*” (Job 42:10). Intercession brings us near to the heart of God.

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THE BIG IDEA

A good prayer list contains more than names; it aims at specific needs. Revival praying asks for more than physical, material, and temporal blessings—it seeks spiritual and eternal help. There are many things for which we need to pray, but there is one thing for which we should begin to pray: a definite move of God in our day. It is time for God’s people to believe Him and begin to seek His face!



THE STORY

Read Ezra 9:1-8. Ezra’s prayer for himself and his people is both specific and personal. His priority was to seek the Lord and lead others to do the same. Ezra was a man of prayer and spiritual power and

DIGGING INTO GOD'S WORD

SCRIPTURE: EZRA 7:6; 9:9-10:5

FOUNDATIONAL TRUTHS

- It is easier to pray for relief than for revival. Our great objective in prayer must always be _____
The glory of God
alone (Psalm 85:6).
- We must recognize that though circumstances may be bad, our God is always *good* and we have immediate access to Him (Colossians 3:1-3).
- Revivals are marked by “*extraordinary* _____
praying.” Extraordinary praying is seeking God day and night until He does that which is beyond the ordinary (Jeremiah 33:3).



THE BIG IDEA

When you begin to see spiritual stirrings, remember that it is only the beginning of what God wants to do. This is not the time to let up; it is the time to press through! Let the Lord be thorough with you. Revival doesn't begin at a church altar, but in the quiet place where you seek Him. It doesn't culminate with one man preaching a message, but with a multitude of people in prayer.



THE STORY

Read Ezra 9:9-10:5. In the rest of Ezra's prayer he rehearses the holiness, justice, and mercy of God. The next chapter in our story reveals that one man's revival praying resulted in repentance in the whole congregation. Public praying grows out of private



KEY VERSE

“This Ezra went up from Babylon; and he was a ready scribe in the law of Moses, which the LORD God of Israel had given: and the king granted him all his request, according to the hand of the Lord his God upon him.”

—Ezra 7:6

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praying. You never know what God may set in motion through your prayers!



DIGGING INTO GOD'S WORD

Earlier in the book of Ezra we are told that Ezra “*was a ready scribe*” (7:6). The Hebrew word *ready* carries with it the idea of diligence. It is time for God’s people to be diligent in the attention they give to God’s Word and prayer, ready for revival.

As we listen to Ezra pray in Ezra 9, we hear him diligently seeking the Lord. This is where all revival praying begins:

1. We must begin with Him.

- a. Rehearse God’s mercy (Ezra 9:9).
- b. Review God’s Word (Ezra 9:10-12).
- c. Remember God’s goodness (Ezra 9:13).
- d. Recognize God’s righteousness (Ezra 9:14-15).

Revival is always connected to God’s revelation of Himself.

THIRTY DAYS OF REVIVAL PRAYING

“Pray without ceasing.” –I Thessalonians 5:17

One month may change the direction of a person’s life. In thirty days, new habits can be formed. Satan attempted to stop Daniel from praying for thirty days (Daniel 6:7), perhaps thinking that if he stopped the discipline of prayer for thirty days he would never begin again. Instead we are told, *“Now when Daniel knew that the writing was signed, he went into his house; and his windows being open in his chamber toward Jerusalem, he kneeled upon his knees three times a day, and prayed, and gave thanks before his God, as he did aforetime”* (Daniel 6:10).

Will you take the thirty day prayer challenge? Commit to meet God each day this month in prayer.

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Claim these prayer promises for the next thirty days.

Choose one of the great prayer verses of Scripture as your prayer verse. Meditate on the truth. Talk to God about His promise and by faith claim it as you pray. Share the promise and your own answers to prayer with others.
